

As a parent of a student in a Title I school, you have the right to ask for the following information regarding your child's classroom teacher:

- Whether the teacher meets the state qualifications and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction;
- Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or provisional status because of special circumstances; and
- The undergraduate major of the teacher and the area of study and any certificates for any graduate degrees earned.



You have the right to request information regarding the qualifications of the paraprofessional assisting your child's teacher:

- Whether the paraprofessional has completed at least two years of study at an institution of higher education;
- Whether the paraprofessional has completed an associate's degree (or higher);
- Whether the paraprofessional has met a rigorous standard of quality through our state's certification procedure for determining the quality of paraprofessional staff; and
- Whether the paraprofessional has: (a) the knowledge of and ability to assist in instructing reading, writing and mathematics or (b) the knowledge of and the ability to assist in learning activities, such as homework, reading readiness, writing, mathematics and other support as appropriate.

DID YOU KNOW...



you have the right, as a parent, to be kept informed of your child's assessment results?

Assessments provide valuable information both to the school and to parents. They show the growth your child has made in a particular area.

Your school will:

- Notify you of the dates of our state required tests;
- Send home information you may need to help prepare your child for the state tests;
- Share MAP results for participating grade levels;
- Send home classroom assessments in the weekly communication folder;
- Explain what the results of these tests indicate regarding your child's learning; and
- Schedule an appointment with you if you would like to have a more detailed explanation of the results and activities you can do at home to further your child's academic growth.

To maximize daily English Language Arts (ELA) instruction, our curriculum is based on the *South Carolina College- and Career-Ready Standards for English Language Arts*, adopted instructional materials, and supplemental materials. Teachers use gradual release methods that include whole group and small group instruction and independent work in the areas of both reading and writing.

Your child will be taught skills such as:

- Phonemic Awareness (recognizing individual sounds in words)
- Phonics (sounding out new words)
- Fluency (ability to read text accurately, quickly and with expression)
- Vocabulary (spelling, phonics and word study)
- Comprehension (understanding the text)
- Communication Skills
- Writing Process (planning, drafting, revising, editing, rewriting, publishing, and reflecting)

To enable students to become mathematical thinkers and problem solvers, our curriculum is based on the *South Carolina College- and Career-Ready Standards for Mathematics*, district-adopted instructional materials, and other resources. Through guided and independent practice using a variety of whole-group, small-group, individual, and self-directed learning experiences, students develop competency, confidence, fluency, and a deep understanding of:

- Number Sense and the Number System
- Algebraic Thinking and Mathematical Operations
- Geometry
- Measurement and Data Analysis

To prepare for success, students develop reasoning, problem-solving, and communication skills to:

- Describe, explain, and make predictions about their observations
- Connect mathematical ideas to real-world problem situations
- Select and use appropriate tools effectively
- Analyze, explain, and/or justify their solutions and the work of others
- Use precise mathematical language and accurate computations

To help students succeed:

- Show a positive attitude toward math!
- Share ways you use math - sorting, measuring, building, baking, shopping, scheduling events, etc.
- Use math at home and in the car - use mile markers, labels on products, etc.
